ST DENYS CHURCH EVINGTON, BULLETIN Sunday 7th September 2025, 12th Sunday after Trinity





Readings for today: Philemon 1-21; Luke 14 vs 25-33

On the 1st September, we entered Creationtide, a time set aside in the church's calendar dedicated to God as Creator and sustainer of all life.

I wonder, if you look out of your windows do you see lots of wonderful colours? When I looked at my garden a couple of weeks ago, I was really disappointed to not find any colour apart from green leaves! The beautiful roses had gone over, the hollyhocks were producing seeds, I could go on. However, as I sat in my garden this week enjoying a cup of tea, something caught my eye, I couldn't believe that a tiny hollyhock had started to produce flowers, followed a day later by my roses coming into bloom again!

I started to reflect on this. My mind started to think about the various passages and stories from the bible which feature people being given second chances. In Matthew 18 verses 21 - 22, Peter asked how many times he should forgive someone to which Jesus states 77 times, this number signifying the need for continuous forgiveness. How easy or difficult do you find it to forgive, either yourself or someone else? Each week in our church services, we seek God's forgiveness, it is such an important part of our faith, with so many references to forgiveness in the bible.

If we forgive others and ourselves too, we and others are set free and able to produce fruit that God can use to reveal himself to other people. If you are in need of his forgiveness, know that God will forgive you. Galatians 5 v 1 says 'It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again.'

I encourage you this week to consider looking at the beautiful space outside, whether that be from your window, a walk around your garden or even the arboretum. As you do so, ask God to reveal something new to you; you might be as surprised as I was when I noticed the new rose buds and hollyhock coming back to life! *Continued overleaf.....*

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Prayer: Creator God, in bright light and dull darkness, in the energy of each day and the rest that comes with night, we remember the goodness of God.

In the heavens high above our heads, in waters that run deep around the world, we remember the goodness of God.

In solid land and flowing seas, in vivid flowers and fruit laden-trees, we remember the goodness of God.

In the rising and setting of the sun, and the cycles of the seasons; in the patterns of the shining stars, we remember the goodness of God.

In oceans teeming with fish, in skies filled with birds, we remember the goodness of God.

In a world filled with animal life, And in ourselves as human beings, we remember the goodness of God.

And God looked and saw all that he had made, and indeed it was very, very good.

In rest and reflection, in wonder and worship, we remember the goodness of God. Amen.

I started to ponder and wonder what was going on and then I felt I heard God speak to me about how often do we count ourselves out? I had given up thinking that my plants would flower again. At times, I lack confidence and may try to avoid doing something if it might be too challenging, take up too much time or I might fail at it. I have been on a journey the last couple of years as I explore a call to ordained ministry, and whilst I don't know where this journey will lead I have learned to become much more reliant on God and trust him at every step of the way, I would like to encourage you too to draw closer to God through the ups and downs of life.

Last week I was sat in another garden, that of Bishop Saju. We had a cup of tea and to my surprise, after 30 minutes, he informed me that he was happy to sponsor me on the next stage of the discernment journey. I should also point out that the bishop's garden was similar to mine! **Kimberley**



A reflection by Jessie Tang, the diocesan Intercultural Ministry Director, on her familial journey and the stories of many others who've migrated into our cities and worshipping communities:

My dad came to the UK from Hong Kong in the 1970s, part of a wave of migration from Hong Kong and South China and in the 1980s, my mum came over from Malaysia to London, to work and to study. Like others, they found jobs in the catering trade, often working long hours in restaurants and takeaways, to provide for our family.

This September, during East & Southeast Asian (ESEA) Heritage Month, we are called to reflect on the theme Reframing Resilience. Resilience is an important attribute in life - not least for those who become immigrants in other lands.

As people migrate, they often carry the weight of leaving behind their homes, cultures, and languages. Upon arrival, they must navigate a new culture while facing potential prejudice and isolation in a country that may not always welcome them.

For some, in my parents' generation, resilience was not simply about survival; it was about sacrifice - a willingness to give up something of themselves so that their children could grow up with opportunities they never had. Continued overleaf 6

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Sacrifice is also an important principle in the intercultural church. In order for my sibling in Christ to come alive in their worship and connect with God with their own culture or language, I may have to lay down some of my cultural preferences or learn to say 'peace be with you' in an unfamiliar tongue to myself.

Furthermore, if the premise of an intercultural church is that the cultures in the church make up the overall culture of the church, then heritage plays an essential role.

The stories, cultures, experiences and contributions of its members are valued in such a church. When we bring the good of our heritage - our food, our music, our languages, our histories - into the shared life of the church, we embody a colourful vision of the church as it is intended to be, and one that reflects heaven on earth.

Revelation 7:9 reads: "After this I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb."

For me, celebrating and honouring ESEA heritage means remembering the past, thanking my immigrant parents for their sacrifices, and living faithfully in the present — in a way that recognises how the resilience of parents is passed down to their children and can be shared with others.

It also reminds me that my culture and heritage is important, and that diversity is a gift to the whole body of Christ.

This month, as we celebrate ESEA Heritage, let us give thanks for the sacrifices of those who came before us, recognise the resilience they instilled in us, and continue building a legacy of faith and contribution for the generations to come.
