Readings for today: Galatians 1 vs 11-16a; Matthew 19 vs 27-end

Dear Friends, this week we said a fond farewell to Barrie Coleman, former Churchwarden of St Denys, dearly beloved husband of Marjorie, and a loving and devoted father, grandfather and great-grandfather. At his funeral I was privileged to read out some wonderful family reminiscences, penned by Marjorie and family. Jeff, one of their sons, told us this: *'There was nothing like a hug or a handshake from Barrie to let you know he cared and accepted you for who you are.'*

You can tell a lot from a person's handshake. It seems Barrie's was always utterly genuine. I am sure we have all experienced the other kind of handshake, which discloses insincerity or aggression; clammy and limp or painfully crushing. We need more people like Barrie.

I am writing this bulletin letter having been following the news surrounding the meeting of world leaders and their chief economists at Davos in Switzerland. President Trump has just issued what seems to be something of a climbdown over his absurd proposal to take Greenland by force of arms, but he is still pursuing a claim to its 'ownership' which flouts all notions and norms of international law and diplomacy. His agents, under the sinister acronym 'ICE', are terrorising innocent people, his own citizens, in some ghastly attempt to rid their nation of a class of vilified and demonised people. I am sure I am not alone in hearing echoes of the jackboots of Nazi Germany. The gallant people of his nation who gave their lives to save the world from such horrors must be turning in their graves. I do not believe I am being controversial in proposing that Donald Trump has brought shame upon his own great nation and that his egregious actions and pronouncements throughout the short term of his presidency are causing huge consternation amongst many, if not most, decent Americans, and all around the world. He is a man whose hand I would definitely not wish to shake.

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When we shake hands with each other and exchange the peace at church, it is an outward and visible sign of Christ's peace. St John's Gospel Chapter 14, verse 27, records what Jesus said:

'Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid'.

Barrie is now at peace and beyond the troubles of the world in the embrace of his Lord and Saviour. We all earnestly seek that peace on earth and will only find it when we are at peace with ourselves and with each other. Peace is costly, fragile, and can never be taken for granted. I pray that the peacemakers, whom Jesus blessed and called 'children of God', will remain 'the still, small voice of God', and with God's gentle and sincere handshake of trust and protection will win back the world from those whose hands are raised in threat and stained with blood. 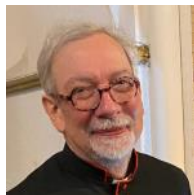
