*Readings for today, **10am:** 2 Peter 1 vs 16-end; Matthew 17 vs 1-9, **4pm:** 2 Kings 2 vs 1-12; Matthew 17 vs 9-23 (or 1-23)*

Dear Friends, last week, I explored Richard Dawkins' views as to why creation was a Godless event. Today I review some counter-arguments, taking as my guiding light Revd Dr Rodney Holder, an eminent mathematician, astrophysicist and ordained Anglican minister.

Dawkins takes a reductionist view of creation, arguing that the universe and its varied lifeforms are only atoms, molecules and electrical impulses. For Holder, this theory cannot explain moral values, the ordered structure of the universe or why there is something rather than nothing.

These are some of the arguments which Holder advances to support a God-centered view of creation:

1. The structured nature of the universe, the universality of scientific laws and the development of morality require explanation. He sees these as the product of intelligent design by a creator.

Dawkins dismisses this, regarding the special attributes of the universe as being just a fact; adopting the view that "it is what it is" without explanation.

2. Most scientists believe that the probability of the conditions for intelligent life existing by chance are extraordinarily remote.

Dawkins counters this with a multiverse argument; that if enough universes exist there is a high probability of one or more having the right conditions by chance.

Holder's view is that a purposeful creator is a more satisfying argument than one based on chance and that only purposeful design can explain the physical laws and reality of creation. ***Continued overleaf.....***

3. The “Big Bang” theory - the idea that the universe was created by the expansion of an almost infinitely hot, dense and small speck of matter and energy - is much in vogue.

For Dawkins this offers a complete explanation of creation, without the need for intelligent design. By contrast, Holder argues that the theory is consistent with the Christian view that the universe had a beginning and was created from nothing by God.

4. Morality also divides the two. Dawkins sees it as the result of human reasoning and cultural evolution, rejecting absolute morality in favour of morals founded on the shifting sands of cultural change.

Holder’s view is that moral truths are real and derived from God; that Dawkins only explains behaviour not morality. He sees morals as the gift of a kindly God, not the passing whim of any given community.

Constraints of space mean that I have only skimmed over this complex topic but I hope that my words may help to stimulate your own thoughts.

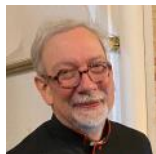

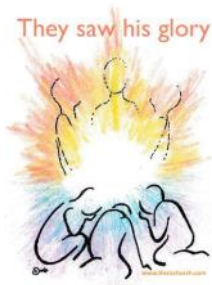
